But it left me asking serious questions of myself - why had I (or anyone else) never seen it before? Why had I never looked up? Could I have looked up before and never spotted it?

The stain on my lounge ceiling reminded me of much of today's attitude towards Christmas.

Although we may be restricted in what we can do and where we can go this year, we can still become distracted with so many events, present buying, writing and sending of cards, shopping for food, and meeting the many demands of family and friends - that we simply don't have time for Jesus.

In other words, we are so busy '**looking down**' - and consumed with all that the world demands of us, that we become convinced if we don't satisfy all these demands - then we will simply **not** enjoy Christmas!

And in our 'busyness' we **fail** to '**look up**' - we **fail** to see Jesus who is the real 'reason for the season.' Like my water stain - Jesus is there, He is always there with us - but we don't take time to spot Him or taken any notice of Him.

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His resurrection, angels approached those who were searching for Jesus' body in the garden, and asked them - 'Why are you looking for the living among the dead? He is **not** here; He has risen!'

We are often guilty of looking for Jesus in the **wrong** place - and **not** just at Christmas time. Sadly, many still seek Jesus in the trappings and tinsel of Christmas - and do **not** find Him.

Many of us are so busy '**looking down**' when we should be '**looking up**'

If I had ignored my water stain for a long period time it could have led to disastrous consequences - and the same is true if we continue to ignore the reality and presence of Jesus in our lives. Jesus longs for us to seek Him, know Him and to enjoy Him.

This Advent season, my prayer for you all is - please take the time and the many wonderful opportunities that are given to us as a church family and community **not** to '**look down**' but instead - to '**look up**' - to '**look up**' - and rejoice in **Jesus** who came down from heaven to be our Saviour, and our Lord!!

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Finally, may I say that the COVID restrictions have prevented me from getting to know so many of you and providing the pastoral support that you deserve. And for that, I am sorry.

But it has been a real joy to return to the church building and enjoy our times of worship, albeit in a different way.
