'UNCHARTED WATERS!'

How often have we heard that expression over the past few months?

Politicians and the media have chosen to use that expression to describe the unknown consequences of recent events and decisions taken whether it be in relation to the politics of the Middle East, America, or even nearer to home, namely – Brexit, or especially Coronavirus!

As you know it is an expression that has its roots in sailing - it's when we journey into areas that are unfamiliar to us - situations that have never been properly mapped out.

These journeys are often risky and full of potential danger.

The Gospel writers record a boat journey that Jesus took one day with His disciples. They had not ventured far when a furious storm arose.


The disciples, many of them who were seasoned fishermen, became very afraid and began to look for Jesus to save them from drowning. To their amazement, they found Jesus **sleeping** in the rear of the boat completely unaware of the impending danger.

On waking, we read that Jesus replied - 'You of little faith, **why** are you so afraid?' The account tells us that Jesus then rebuked the winds and the waves, and the waters became calm again. The danger had passed.

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As we consider both Post-Brexit and these Coronavirus days, we too will be faced with many 'uncharted waters' situations that at first appear calm and familiar to us, but then suddenly change to become stormy and out of control and we too become just like the disciples - very afraid! Yet our account from the Bible teaches us that Jesus is always with us - He was in the boat with the disciples then and still He travels with us every day even through the most difficult times in our lives. For that one brief moment the disciples forgot about all about Jesus - they placed their hope on the storm abating from their many years of sailing experience - instead of turning to Jesus. As I have mentioned, these times of both Post Brexit and Post Coronavirus will inevitably bring about many changes for us internationally, nationally and yes, even locally. Many of us see these as moving into 'uncharted waters' but unlike the disciples, we must remember that Jesus has promised 'never to leave or forsake us' - He remains beside us in our 'boat' no matter what - so we must **never** be afraid. Instead, we must be those of faith - those who trust Jesus those who will place every situation and every aspect of our future into His hands. Church Music



Frog Report: Reddit Reddit (June 2020) There is much turmoil in our world at present with demands for statues to be removed etc. Black Lives Matter protests and demands for reparation for past involvement in the historic slave trade. I recently read a book which gives a pretty balanced view of that evil Written by Jonathan Aitken trade. former Conservative Cabinet minister under John Major and prison inmate (found guilty of perjury serving 7 months of an 18 month sentence). In this biographical book "John Newton: From Disgrace to Grace", Aitken has revealed the life of the man who was a slave trader and subsequently a slave himself. The details contained in this well researched book gives (extensive bibliography) an interesting perspective on two sides of the slave trade. Some harrowing details of the vileness of the trade in human flesh itself as well as some of the conversion of Newton and his views of the business from the outside. Statements from Newton include this self denunciating quotation from his own publication, "Thoughts Upon the African Slave Trade." "I hope it will always be a subject of humiliating reflection to me that I was an active instrument in a business at which my heart now shudders." Newton of course we know goes on to write one of the great hymns of all time "Amazing Grace". Aitken fills in some little known background information about the hymn and the final version of the tune we now sing, only united with the lyrics in 1835, by one William Walker./
